Preparing for worship

The year was 1978 in the Roxbury neighborhood of Boston. A group of five teenage boys came together and created a band, New Edition, so named to indicate they were a new edition of the Jackson 5. The group reached the height of its popularity in the 1980s and according to some musicologists became the model for the modern boy band.

In 1988 the group debuted a No. 1 hit, "Can You Stand the Rain." The '80s babies out there might know these lyrics already, but here is a refresher:

Sunny days, everybody loves them Tell me... can you stand the rain? Storms will come This we know for sure Can you stand the rain?

The gist of the song is quite simple. Everybody can deal with the sunny days when all things seem to be at peace and easy. But on the days where things get messy, muddy and muddled, will you still be around? When misinformation seems to run rampant, will you use your voice for truth, justice and mercy? I know New Edition was asking this of a spouse or partner, but these questions would have been appropriate for those who became deacons in the early church. This journey is not easy, and I know you are good when the sun is out, but can you stand the rain?

R.P. Symonds wrote, "There is a story of Lawrence, deacon of Rome, martyred 258, who on his arrest was ordered to hand over the treasures of the church. He returned with the poor of the Christian community, the jewels of Christ's people." While this story may be a legend, it reflects the diaconal preoccupation with the welfare of the local church.

This morning, we ordain and reinstate deacons. Together, they bring different experiences, backgrounds and stories that will make us more the *imago dei*. As part of the free church tradition and holding deeply to the local autonomy of the church, our deacons do not make all the decisions for our congregation. But they are representative of our congregation, always discerning and evermore concerned for the welfare of the church.

Thank you for your "yes" on the sunny days of Wilshire and even on the days it may rain.

THE CHRISTIANS BY LUCAS HNATH



Faith in 3D • Feb. 15 & 17

Wilshire's Faith in 3D initiative will present *The Christians*, a dramatic play by Lucas Hnath, on Thursday, Feb. 15, at 7:30 p.m. and Saturday, Feb. 17, at 2:30 p.m. in the Sanctuary. Nancy Poynter is directing the cast of five Wilshire actors, and Ralph Manuel is directing a 25-voice choir. The *Christians*, which explores the aftermath of a controversial sermon delivered by a megachurch pastor, has been called "a gripping and introspective examination of faith, belief and the consequences of theological shifts within a congregation" (Oklahoma Gazette). A New York Times reviewer called playwright Hnath "one of the brightest voices of his generation." This year's production marks the 10th anniversary of Faith in 3D. Annual church conference recap

Wilshire conducted church business and heard a State of the Church Address from Senior Pastor Timothy Peoples at its Annual Church Conference on Jan. 21. The church approved revisions to Wilshire's bylaws and approved a 2024 Unified Budget of \$3,925,000.

Timothy spoke about the Hebrew word not or *chalom*, meaning dream, and said, "This year I want us to be looking deeply into the dreams of our congregation." He recalled asking people to turn in answers to the question, "What do you need?," and reported that "connection" was the most common answer. "Relationship is everything we do," Timothy said. "So we're going to work at building deeper relationships."

Timothy challenged Wilshire to make itself more accessible to the differently abled and neurodivergent, saying we would learn from churches already doing this work.

He said we remain on track to relaunch the pastoral residency program in August, noting that we already have applicants. He also reminded congregants that Pathways to Ministry doesn't refer only to the residency program but also includes interns, choral scholars and support for seminarians.

At one point Timothy showed a blank page in his presentation, saying "We're going to be a church that leaves space for how the Spirit is moving and directing and leading us in ways that we cannot see or imagine."

Highlights of 2023 cited by Timothy included strong participation in Sanctuary Choir and other music groups despite the minister of music transition; continued strength in mission activities; and a number of new members comparable to prepandemic years: 76.

Timothy and Director of Finance Lori Gooden recapped 2023 giving, which resulted in a surplus of \$252,726, noting:

New member and prospect gifts totaled \$104,551.

■ All age groups except one gave more than the previous year, with those 18 and younger giving \$5,000 more.

■ Of 430 giving units in December, 67% were gifts in the \$1 to \$1,000 range.

■ Surplus funds from 2023 will be put into mission work, building reserve, the music transition and building and technology renovations.

Conversations Art by Vikki J. Martin South Lobby Through Feb. 28

Conversations, an art exhibit intended to spark dialogue on racial justice, will be on display in the South Lobby from Jan. 21 through Feb. 28. The 24 watercolor and scratchboard pieces in Vikki J. Martin's *Clotilda* series use the life cycle of the cotton plant to memorialize the enslaved people transported to the U.S. by the schooner *Clotilda*, the last known slave ship to bring captives from Africa to the American South.
